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Message from Chief Tom McKenzie

The Lethbridge Regional Police Service is committed to providing safe communities through partnerships, community participation and excellence in service delivery.

We serve the citizens of Lethbridge and Coaldale with respect, honesty, integrity, excellence and commitment. Guided by the four pillars of policing – public safety, public trust, public confidence and professionalism – we will continue working to strengthen partnerships, reduce crime and disorder and ensure citizens feel safe in their neighbourhoods.

In 2010 the Lethbridge Regional Police Service implemented strategies to increase the presence of police officers on the street, enhance capacity in investigative units and expand the use of technology in areas such as crime reporting and traffic enforcement.

Street strength was increased to ensure calls for service continue to be answered in a timely fashion and create greater opportunities for proactive policing initiatives. In addition, members were added to the Economic Crimes Unit, Priority Crimes Unit and Violent Crimes Unit to meet the demands of increasingly complex and time-consuming investigations. In 2010 the Service also completed the installation of Intersection Safety Devices (ISDs) at three city intersections and the Alternative Reporting Team (ART) was instrumental in creating efficiencies both in online reporting and internally to manage minor crime reports.

Other successes include the hiring of 11 new police officers, completion of a comprehensive on-site evaluation by members of the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) which resulted in the Service's fifth accreditation certificate and an international award presented to our Victim/Witness Services Unit for excellence in victim services.

In 2010 there were 55,550 police actions taken in Lethbridge and Coaldale, including calls for service and other officer-initiated events – an increase of seven per cent over the previous year.

Overall in 2010 our clearance rates continued to exceed the national average and we experienced decreases in the volume of both crimes against persons and crimes against property. Reductions were recorded in robberies, assaults, sexual offences, break-ins, thefts and vehicle thefts. Unfortunately we also experienced increases in some areas. Mischief offences and frauds increased over the previous year and matters involving domestic violence continue to impact our communities.

I am thankful to all of our members for their hard work, dedication and productivity in 2010, but as we move forward it is also important to take a moment and reflect back on the loss of Cst. Sheldon Twigg who died in a collision along with his wife, daughter and granddaughter. Following Cst. Twigg's death our Service received tremendous support from our communities and other law enforcement agencies and for that we are truly grateful.

LRPS Division Highlights




Community Policing Division Inspector Bill Kaye

The Community Policing Division provides a frontline response to calls for service.

In 2010 the Community Policing Division increased the presence of police officers on the street in order to respond to an increasing number of calls for service and dedicate more time to crime prevention and other proactive policing activities. Additionally, the increase to street strength in Patrols helped enhance officer visibility which is something our citizens requested. Traffic enforcement by patrol members also increased which helped contribute to a reduction in collisions.

Building and expanding relationships was a key theme in 2010 for the Community Resource Unit. The You and the Law course was expanded to the Newcomers Outreach Program between Immigrant Services, Child Services and Canadian Border Services to help newcomers feel safer, understand their rights and feel comfortable about approaching the police. Police officers participated in a cultural night with First Nations youth to hand-sew a tipi that was showcased during Whoop Up Days and a Seniors Safety Calendar was produced in partnership with Family and Community Support Services, the Lethbridge Senior Citizens Organization and the Alberta Motor Association. In addition, the Community Liaison office, Traffic Response Unit and School Resource Unit participated in the first-ever bicycle/pedestrian safety rodeo which involved multiple local and provincial agencies. Other events including Free the Fuzz and the Law Enforcement Torch Run Bike Ride each raised over \$20,000 for Special Olympics.

Members of the Traffic Response Unit were involved in the Olympic Winter Games and worked with VANOC to provide security and a traffic escort for the Olympic Flame when it passed through Lethbridge and Coaldale. The Intersection Safety Device program was also completed in 2010 with the implementation of monitoring equipment at three intersections.

The Downtown Beat Unit (DBU) expanded its partnerships with local agencies including the Lethbridge Fire Department, Alberta Gaming and Liquor Commission, Regulatory Services and Alberta Health to target issues involving drinking establishments. DBU also participated in a number of small and large-scale projects to address issues facing the downtown core such as street prostitution, illegal liquor consumption and drug trafficking.



Criminal Investigation Division Inspector Colin Catonio

The Criminal Investigation Division investigates ongoing complicated and major criminal investigations that require specialized and dedicated resources.

In 2010 the Criminal Investigation Division responded to a growing demand to assign dedicated investigators to new and emerging crime trends. As a result an additional member was added to the Economic Crimes Unit, two new members were added to the Priority Crimes Unit to manage high-risk offenders and another investigator was assigned to the Violent Crimes Unit. While challenged by the frequency and complexity of violent crime, investigators have kept pace with investigative demands resulting in offenders being brought to justice for crimes ranging from robbery to serious assault to domestic violence. Domestic crimes remain a concern because of their wide impacts to family, community, victims and their children.

The Special Operations Unit demonstrated repeated success in pursuing supplier level drug dealers, many of whom are associates or members of sophisticated regional and provincial crime groups. Most drug investigations centered on cocaine trafficking activity because cocaine remains in high demand in our region. Unfortunately many property crimes and crimes of violence are a product of the drug trade and organized crime activity. Our efforts have been relatively successful in reducing the consistent presence of gang structure in Lethbridge and Coaldale that has been seen in larger centres.

The proliferation of digital technologies and the internet have created fertile ground for financial exploitation in limitless fashion. The Economic Crimes Unit responded with significant investigative successes in a variety of cases to dismantle schemes of fraud and theft. At the same time the unit has promoted prevention methods with retailers, financial institutions and individuals.

We continue to support integrated policing strategies advanced by the Alberta Law Enforcement Response Teams (ALERT) through our participation in regional investigations and with assignment of members to the Integrated Threat and Risk Assessment Centre (ITRAC), Integrated Child Exploitation Unit (ICE) and Lethbridge Integrated Intelligence Unit (LIU). The efforts of the Lethbridge Regional Police Service together with police agencies across Alberta are having an impact on organized and serious crime.





**Administrative Services Division
Inspector Tom Ascroft**

The Administrative Services Division manages the Police Service’s budget, business activities, human resources and public complaint investigations.

During 2010 the Administrative Services Division worked closely with Corporate Facility Services to address ever-increasing spatial needs within the headquarters building. This work culminated with the presentation of a master plan to City Council. An addition to the police building has been approved and is scheduled for planning in 2013 and construction in 2014–2015.

In collaboration with the Lethbridge Police Association, the Administrative Services Division worked towards a negotiated modification of the shift patterns worked by patrol teams. Once implemented, the Service will be in a position to better staff for call loads, resulting in improved services to the community.

During 2010 seven new recruits and four experienced members were recruited and trained to meet the ongoing needs of the Service.

In December of 2010 the Policy and Accreditation Unit hosted two assessors representing the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) for the triannual on-site assessment. Following the assessment the Service was recommended for its fifth re-accreditation.



**Support Services Division
Inspector Jeff Cove**

The Support Services Division supports the Police Service in a number of areas including Information Technology (IT), records management, tactical, K9 and explosives disposal, as well as the joint management of the Public Safety Communications Centre (PSCC).

In 2010 the PSCC processed nearly 68,000 emergency and non-emergency calls. As a result police were dispatched to nearly 32,000 calls for service.

The Police Service’s use of computers and technology to manage police reports, record and store electronic information and media has progressively increased over the years and 2010 was no exception. Our IT Unit completed a number of projects inclusive of upgrading servers, increasing electronic data storage, upgrading security firewalls and ensuring we have the most current tools in which to provide service. In



2010 the Alberta Police Integrated Information Initiative (API 3) continued to move forward with the selection of a vendor and participation in workshops by staff from all areas of the Service to develop best practices and maximize efficiencies. In addition, the IT Unit and PSCC worked together to implement a computer-aided dispatch software solution that will allow police, fire and emergency services to be dispatched from the centre and caller information to be shared between agencies to ensure the appropriate resources are dispatched to where they are needed in the proper time.

Online reporting continued to evolve and was used successfully by many citizens to report minor crimes. Our Alternative Reporting Team (ART) has also been instrumental in creating efficiencies that allow not only for online reporting, but also creating and managing reports of minor, non-criminal occurrences so police officers have additional time to attend to more serious crimes and work on crime prevention activities.



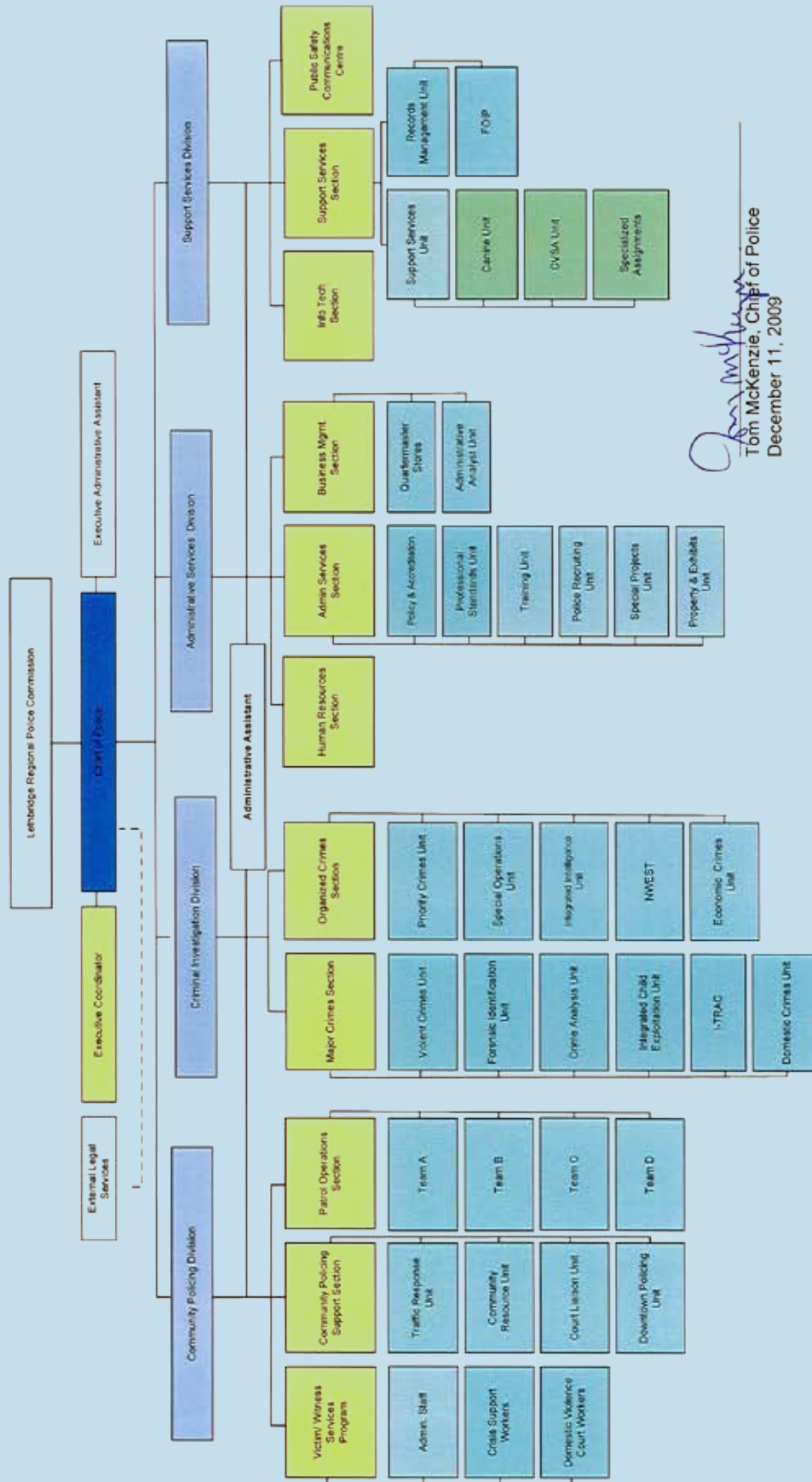
Citizen Letters Of Recognition

Statistical Report - Methodology

This statistical information is derived from computerized data obtained from Lethbridge Regional Police Service Occurrence Stats –All Violations report in NICHE. The data was extracted on March 22, 2011 and is subject to variation from previously published statistical reports due to the nature of offences being reported and cleared. An incident may be comprised of one or more offences or violations of the law, or non- offence occurrences and therefore all of these are included in our totals. Data is calculated on a calendar year basis consisting of data from January 1 through December 31. This data is further confirmed through review by the investigational units.

OFFENCES are counted based on the reported date. CLEARANCES are counted in the month the offence is CLEARED BY CHARGE or CLEARED OTHERWISE. An offence is CLEARED BY CHARGE when at least one offender has been identified and charged in connection with that offence. An offence is CLEARED OTHERWISE when at least one offender has been identified and there is sufficient evidence to lay a charge but no charge is laid for one of the following reasons:

- a) the offender dies or is committed to a Mental Institution,
- b) the complainant or an essential witness dies,
- c) the offender is less than 12 years old,
- d) the offender has diplomatic immunity or there is government policy preventing prosecution,
- e) the offender is not in Canada and cannot be returned,
- f) the offender has been charged or is serving a sentence for another incident and it is decided not to proceed with a charge for this particular offence,
- g) the complainant does not wish prosecution against the offender,
- h) the police decide to warn the offender or recommend the offender for the Alternative Measures Program instead of laying a charge.

The CLEARANCE RATE is calculated by dividing the actual offences reported by the total offences cleared (offences cleared by charge plus offences cleared by other). Clearances also include offences reported in previous years and cleared in the current year; therefore for some offence types the clearance rate may exceed 100%.

The PERCENT CHANGE for incidents reported is calculated by subtracting the number of incidents for the preceding year from the number of incidents for the current year, dividing by the number of incidents for the preceding year then converting to a percent by multiplying by 100.

For example, if there were 563 assaults in 2006 and 516 assaults in 2007, then the percent change is calculated as follows: $(516-563)/563 \times 100 = -8.3\%$. When the percent change is displayed as “-”, it simply means statistically the mathematical equation cannot be carried out as it is trying to divide by 0.

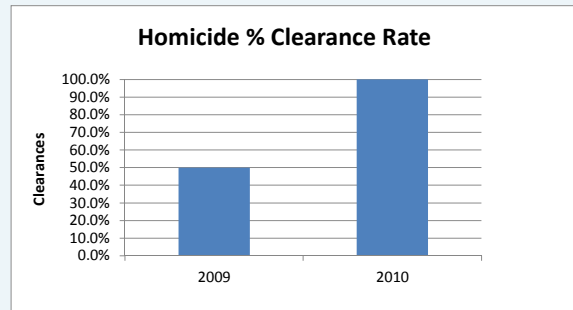
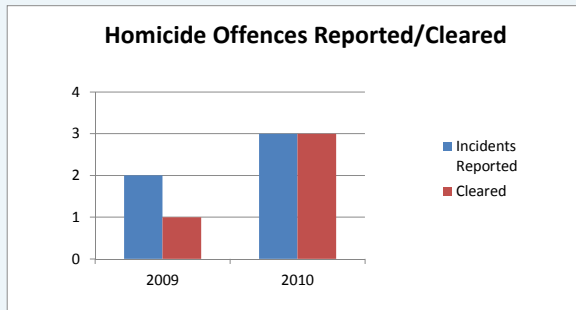
TRAFFIC OFFENCES are counted based on the reported date. Generally, a traffic offence relates to a charge laid for a specific violation. Abandoned vehicles and Hit and Run collisions are exceptions. They are reported and cleared in the same manner as non- traffic offences.

Commercial robberies have decreased by 44% in 2010 with an overall solvency rate of 61% (11 of 18). Other robberies have decreased by 13% and the number of robberies with weapons displayed has also decreased. The solvency rates for robberies have remained fairly consistent with a slight decrease of 2% in 2010.

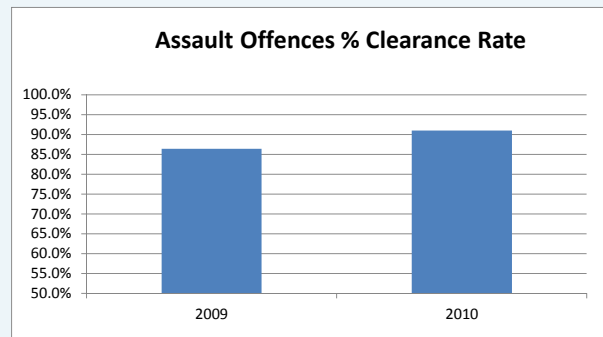
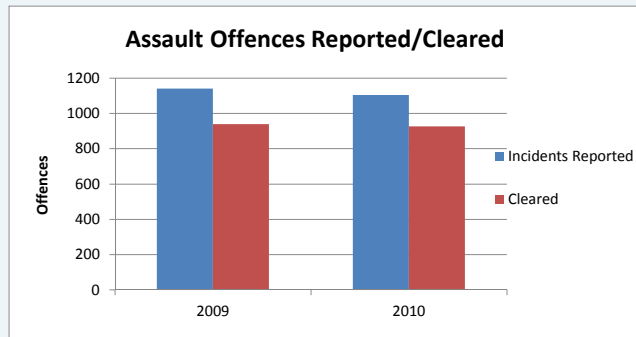

Domestic Violence incidents increased slightly from 2009 to 2010, a similar increase in charges is also evident. Family Dispute charges are significantly lower due to these offences not necessarily being chargeable. Clearance rates are not shown due to the fact that there is no actual charge for the domestic violence category (i.e. the charge would be assault and not domestic violence).
